Tutor Tips

Using a Thesaurus

This exercise can help increase your student's vocabulary while teaching them to use a thesaurus. Choose a descriptive paragraph for the exercise and underline key words. Before the lesson begins, explain what a thesaurus is and then ask the student to read the chosen paragraph. The student then looks up the underlined words in the paragraph and finds synonyms for each and writes those words down as well. The student then re-reads the paragraph, inserting the new words in lieu of the underlined ones. The student can also copy the paragraph with the new words.

A tutor at Second Start notes:

"Reading through the second time there was less hesitation. There were some words he decided not to change because another word would not have made as much sense. After he had rewritten the paragraph, he read it again with almost no

hesitation. He really liked doing this and seemed pleased to use the bigger words which are in his vocabulary."

Prevent Poisonings

Purposes

To help students acquire information they need to protect themselves and their families from poisonings in the home. To improve comprehension and speaking skills.

The Basic Activity

Use the activity included. It comes from Lesson 9 of Health Stories: Readings and Language Activities for Healthy Choices (Low Beginning) by Ann Gianola (New Readers Press, 2007).

Have students post the national Poison Help number by their phones: 1-800-222-1222.

Teach ESL students how to say the following. The Poison Help staff will connect them to a translator.

I need help. I do not speak English.

I speak [name of language].

My phone number is [insert].

Expansion Activity

Download at no cost the complete version of Lesson 9 with all the activities (plus Teacher's Guide and audio file).

Use product labels to teach the words Poison, Caution, Warning, Danger, and Keep out of the Reach of Children.
