

HOMEWORK TIPS

for Students

The library staff can help you find answers to your questions and resources for your projects. We have books on a wide variety of topics, internet access, newspapers, magazines, CD-ROMs, and videos to help you learn about your subject.

Here are some things that you can do to get the most out of your library visit.

- **Bring your library card.** Library cards are free to all residents of Lake County and to students enrolled in a Lake County school.
- **Bring your written assignment with you.** Make sure that you understand your assignment before you leave school.
- **Bring your stuff.** Have plenty of paper, pencils, pens and other stuff that you may need. There is a copy machine at the library that you can use for a small fee if you



need it. Libraries also have computers with word processing software that you can use.

- **Ask for help if you need it.** The library staff is here to help you find information and materials.
- **Look at all of the resources** in the library for new adventures.
- **Give credit to your reference.** Always include information about your references in your report. Copy the title of the reference, the author, publisher, date and the page numbers where you found your information.
- **Start early.** Start on your project as soon as you can. By giving yourself plenty of time to do your work, you'll be able to enjoy learning about new things without worrying about finishing on time!

HOMEWORK TIPS

for Parents

- **Understand the library.** Know what resources the library has to offer. Learn about them by reading our informational brochure, by asking the library staff and by using the library! All services are free to Lake County residents and students, and through reciprocal borrowing.
- **Understand what your child is supposed to do.** By knowing what the assignment is, you can guide your child into making sure that research on that



subject is accomplished.

- **Make sure that they bring the tools and materials that they'll need.** It's very frustrating to sit down to write notes and realize that you've forgotten a pencil!
- **Look at everything!** Encourage your child to review materials from many sources. Look at books, magazines, newspapers, use the internet and CD-ROMs, etc.
- **Use reference materials in the library.** You can't take reference materials home. The library has a copy machine for your convenience. Be sure that your child has plenty of change!
- **Call us for simple questions.** Our library staff will be happy to answer simple questions over the telephone.
- **Learn is by doing!** Learning to use the library independently is an important part of the educational experience. Encourage your child to do his or her own research--they'll learn a lot about the library and they'll also learn more about the subject that they are researching!
